Did you know that one pint of blood can save three lives? I learned that recently when the Red Cross visited our school. They talked to the fourth and fifth graders about different types of blood and the importance of blood donation.

One type of blood is called o-negative or universal blood because it can be donated to anyone. Only 7 percent of the world has o-negative blood. People who suffer from sickle cell anemia get a lot of blood transfusions. Sickle cell disease is a blood disorder that's inherited which means it's passed down from parents to their children.

But people with sickle cell disease are not the only ones who need blood. In the United States someone is in need of blood every two seconds. Blood cannot be manufactured so people who need blood rely on generous donors. Although almost 40% of the population is eligible to donate, less than 10% actually do each year.

The Centerville Student Council wants to help people in need of blood. We are organizing a blood

drive on February 1st from 2-7pm in the cafeteria. We need your help to spread the word. Please tell friends and family 16 years or older about the blood drive. Snacks and childcare will be provided to all blood donors. Hope to see you there. Every drop makes a difference.


