You have also probably heard of Oprah Winfrey because she is always in the



Did you get a chance to see the super moon on January 31st? The super moon also known as the super blue blood moon is basically a full moon at its closest point to Earth during its orbit. Punxsutawney Phil

Punxsutawney Phil is the name of a groundhog in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. On February 2 (Groundhog Day) each year, the town of Punxsutawney celebrates the legendary groundhog with a special ceremony. During the ceremony Phil emerges from his temporary home According to the tradition, if Phil sees his shadow and returns to his hole, he has predicted six more weeks of winter-like weather. If Phil does not see his shadow, he has predicted an "early spring."

Now, Punxsutawney Phil is not exactly a meteorologist. The Groundhog Day celebration is rooted in a Celtic and Germanic tradition that says that if a hibernating animal casts a shadow on February 2, the Pagan holiday of Imbolc (known among Christians as Candlemas), winter and cold weather will last another six weeks.

So how many times has Punxsutawney Phil gotten the prediction correct. Well, as of 2017, Punxsutawney Phil has made 131 predictions, with an early spring (no shadow) predicted 18 times (13.85%). According to Stormfax, as of 2016 the predictions have proven correct 39% of the time. There you have it folks.
